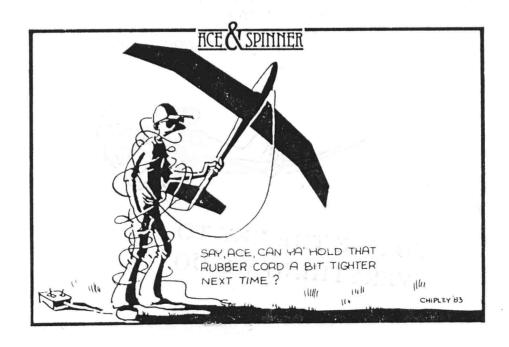
The STRCA funfly at Sayre had super weather and seven fliers from the AGS. The result was a nice day of flying and the usual outcome.

HANGER SESSIONS AGAIN - Several members have asked me if I plan to hold "hanger sessions" again this winter. The answer is yes, since those who participated last winter have expressed an interest in doing it again. We'll start in November and I'll have more information regarding location and time in the next issue of the CONNECTOR.

These sessions are designed to help those members who have or plan to take on the exciting challenge of building and flying pattern aircraft. Notice that I did not include the word compete. You don't have to compete to enjoy the feeling of flying a finely tuned pattern machine and those of us who have been enjoying this aspect of the hobby are always looking

for a better way to build the airframe, install our equipment and put on an attractive but light weight durable finish. These monthly gettogethers are a great way to share our experiences with each other and all become better builders and flyers.

STR/CA NEEDS UPGRADING — I attended the last Southern Tier R/C Association (STR/CA) get—together hosted by the Valley R/C Club at their new field. Those who attended had a good time but it has become apparent to me that the events we fly need to be changed with the expressed intent to provide events that will require more air time. The STR/CA has always emphasized team events with each club competing against the others. This principle is great except that the events that are chosen are events that only require a minute or less of flying time with only one plane in the air at a time. I believe we need to design events that are still team events but provide, 1) a minimum flight time of 6 min. per flight and, 2) the ability to have at least two planes in the air at all times.

Maybe our new STR/CA representatives could lead a discussion at a future club meeting and get some good ideas from the members. The STR/CA was founded in the 60's and we have not changed the format since. I think it's about time for a change and we should let the club members make suggestions that would increase participation and enjoyment for everyone.

HOW DID THEY DO? - Last spring I published a list of club members and the planes they were building for the 1986 season. Now that the end of the season is almost upon us I thought it would be of interest to see how the projects turned out in an effort to provide guidance for this winter's projects. I'll bring the original list along to the October meeting so you can see what you said. Then on a new list I would like everyone to comment on their season's product testing results. Of course there will be good and bad results, uncompleted and/or revised projects and a variety of planes thay were not on the original list. I'll plan to publish the results in the next issue of the CONNECTOR.

A FEW MORE TIPS - This months list will deal with your faithful and so very important rechargeable nicad batteries. It's not intended to be a complete care and feeding type list but a few reminders may be in order at this time of the year when our flying activity tends to

diminish due to the changes in our weather, especially the frequent rain that we have been having which interrupts and changes our plans.

- 1) Charge before each weekend. There is a tendency to forget to charge them at this time of the year because the weather forecasts may call for rain or high winds on the weekends and we figure we'll never get to the field. But you know how many times the weatherman is wrong around here and we may get in a few flights if we are ready.
- 2) Use your battery cycler (by now I'm sure that each of you has one of these great insurance policies) more frequently to keep your battery packs strong and healthy. It's more important to use a cycler when our flying frequency in reduced so that the prolonged idle time between trips to the field will not tend to weaken the batteries.
- 3) Be careful not to get caught thinking that we don't need to put the system on charge just because we only flew one or two flights last weekend. It just might be a beautiful weekend and you may find yourself getting in more flights than you ever dreamed of at this time of the year. There is always a desire to fly as much as possible on these late fall days since we realize that there may be only a very few more great days to follow.
- 4) On the positive side of the story, the cooler fall weather is better for our batteries than the high summer temperatures. Batteries will maintain there charge better in cooler weather, so if you goofed up and didn't charge since last weekend, chances are better that you can squeak in a few flights without a problem in the cooler weather.

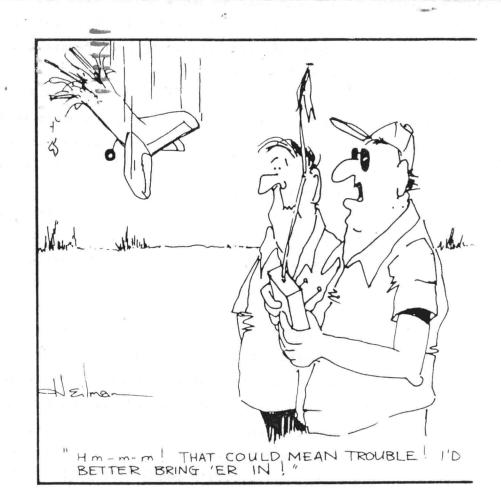
