Know Your Officers -

Program Exchange — Several AGS members have been on the road sharing their talents and representing the AGS by giving programs to a few of our neighbor clubs. Dick Allen and Ralph Jackson shared their experiences from the Byron's Giant Scale Festival with the Binghamton Aeros and the Valley R/C Club at Sayre. Bill Underkofler presented his program on frequencies at an Aeros meeting as well. I have been told that the clubs enjoyed these programs. Thanks to these three.

Mall Show 1988 - This years show was a great success thanks to Dick Fish, all the AGS members who assisted and to the other local R/C clubs who participated. Dick will give a more comprehensive report later in this issue. Thanks Dick.

33rd Annual Pattern Contest - We have received our AMA sanction for this year's contest. The dates are June 25 & 26 and the location will again be the Blue Swan Airport in Sayre. The airport management has been contacted and are again glad to give us the opportunity to use their site. This year our contest will also serve as the National Society of Radio Control Aerobatics (NSRCA) District 1 Championships.

More about this, our biggest event of the year, in future issues.

1988 Activities — Your activities chairman, Jim McKeown, has been hard at work putting together his proposed activities calendar for the coming season. Jim has the survey results which I gave him as well as other input from several other members. Look over Jim's proposed list which will appear later in this issue and we will spend some time at the next meeting getting your thoughts about the activities so we can finalize the calendar in March. Of course, Jim can't run everything himself so please volunteer to help him out and head up one of the events. Jim's objective will be to schedule a varied list of activities that will provide some thing for everyone.

Membership Survey - Here is a summary of the membership phone survey that I did during November. Forty one members were contacted.

- Thirty four people said that they are very satisfied with what the AGS is offering them. That's an 83% satisfaction rate which I think is very good. Seven members did make some suggestions which will be addressed by the board of directors.
- Only fourteen people had suggestions for meeting programs. The others said that we should just keep doing as we have been. The list of suggested programs has been forwarded to Ralph Jackson our Program Chairman.
- 81% of those contacted wised the flying field in 1987. Usage ranged from a few times to several times a week.
- Thirty one members offered suggestions for club activities that they would like the club to hold. This list has been forwarded to our Activities Chairman, Jim McKeown and will be considered by Jim in planning the 1988 activities list.
- The club frequency list has been updated and forwarded to Bill Underkofler, frequency chairman. Bill will be publishing the list and posting it on our bulletin board in the future.
- Fourteen members are interested in the administration and business operations of the club. This included six board members and represents 34% of the people contacted.
- Thirty people said they would be willing to work on a committee. That is 73%, a great indication of support for the club. Your names have been forwarded to several of the committee chairmen. 51% of the members want a Christmas party and as you already know we had a great one on Dec. 20.
- The things that everyone seems to like about the AGS are the friendliness of its members, the variety of talent and our flying field.

Although it was a lengthy task, I had fun doing the survey and chatting with you. As I said several months ago, I want the AGS to be the best club that it can for its members and to do that I must know what you want. So, although the formal survey is over, please don't hesitate to give me a call and let me know what's on your mind.

Safety Corner

Winter Flying Weather Protection*p27,70*

Flying is cold, dense quite air is great! It seems that many of those summer windy days are "canceled" by some of the really quite tolerable warm winter flying weather (relatively speaking, that is). As you take advantage of those few nice days, you need to keep warm. Flying in cold weather requires a bit of common sense to keep reasonably warm and comfortable. Below is a chart I got out of a safety magazine, it is a good indicator of the effect of cold temperature in combination with wind, on your person. Clip and save the chart for future reference. Incidentally, a wind chill temperature of 32 degrees Fahrenheit will not freeze water. A temperature of 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower is required for water to freeze.

Some simple tips for keeping warm. First and foremost, wear a warm cap; wool is best as it traps heat best. Studies by the military have determines that as much as 70% for body heat is lost through the head (hard to believe?) believe it! Do the standard things like wear several layers of moderately light clothing as opposed to a single layer of heavy clothing; this goes for socks too. Keep your feet warm and and dry.

The body produces as much energy as it loses, that's how its temperature is kept constant. Food when introduced into the body increases the kinetic energy in the body. The body "burns" or uses the food. This produces energy which in turn produces heat. The heat is carried to all parts of the body by blood flow. Sooo.. it's a good idea to have a good meal before you go flying in the cold weather, and brimg those snacks and a warm beverage (high energy kind)!

Because body movement produces heat too, in between flights, keep moving. Maybe circle around the parking lot (you circle... not with the plane)! This will generate some heat. (Of course you can always jump in your car and heat it up..or just jump up and down to keep warm; right?) On a serious note, be alert for frost bite.

One note on equipment. Be especially cautious when flying in the cold with your propeller selection. Avoid plastic at all costs, and be wary of cracked or otherwise defective props. If you haven't flown your plane for some time, be sure to tighten you prop nut, and engine mount screws. Don't forget to tighten your muffler too. Have fun...but lets all be careful out there! #30

Ralph Jackson


