In the interest of "sound" communication, I forgo my usual safety sermon of the month for the latest on noise, ergo the excerpts and paraphrases below. They are plagiarized from AMA National Newsletter.

Noise and Flying Sites Survey - by Geoffrey Styles Director of Public Relations.

Quote: The response to the recent survey has been greater than expected. was encouraged with the high number of returns (questionnaire). High participation allows the AMA to act as a clearing house for information. Good inputs can be evaluated and the results shared with other club members to the benefit of all.

Many clubs have asked specific questions concerning a wide variety of items. Such questions allow the national office to gain good insight into problems we (clubs) face and observe trends that might not otherwise be apparent. We want all of you to know that we are responding by individual letter to specific questions and if you have not received your response yet, be patient. We are working on it; Unquote. Excerpt; "As you may know from reading Model Aviation magazine, noise (sound) is receiving a lot of attention. Many clubs tell us that 90 @ 9 (90 Dba at 9 feet) is achievable, and we congratulate them on reaching the goal. We have also received information concerning workable muffler "add ons" that reduce exhaust noise to much lower levels. You can expect to get all the information just as soon as we can put it into proper form." End excerpt. Excerpt: "The AMA Executive Council voted additional funds to allow AMA staff to spend more time in the field, working one-on-one with clubs that are involved in flying site acquisition." 
