The flying season is virtually upon us. For the new members, I bring to the Safety Rules that govern fliers at the AGS field. These rules are posted in the pit pavilion and must be complied with at all times. They are in fact a copy of the Official AMA Safety Code. If you are unfamiliar with them I urge you to familiarize yourself with them. It is very important to comply with the rules so our AMA insurance coverage applies in the event of an incident. Beyond the safety code is common sense, of which all of us both new and experienced, need to ply diligently. Thank you for your cooperation.

Aluminum Solder. At the last club meeting I showed some aluminum strut work I managed (to do). I mentioned the solder I used and publish it here for your information. It is Harris Aluminum Solder Kit and has a melting point of 500 or 550 degrees Fahrenheit (I lost the instructions that come with the kit) and is available from PIPE WELDING SUPPLY CO. INC. Upper Court St. Binghamton, N.Y. A word of advice. Do not solder in an area where the fumes will get into the house forced air heating system. You will not endear your wife this this stuff; it smells awful and may be toxic for some people. I suggest using it "outside" such as a garage and even then use a respirator and ventilate too. You can't be too careful. The jar says the stuff contains cadmium (a well know carcinogen). It is fairly easy to work with when you get the hang of it. The trick is to not apply your propane flame directly to the joint and use as "little" of a flame you can get away with and still melt the solder. Good luck.


If you want to have more fun, get involved. A good way to start is by coming to the annual dinner March 25th. Send your reservations to Frank Gioffredo before March 17, 1989.
