Another really, really good month! The RC gods have been with me, please, please don't go away (the winter was rough)! Well off to Olean I went this month, along with Dick Allen and Ralph Jackson, to the S.T.A.R.s Scale Fun Fly. Any size plane is eligible. As last year, a 10 foot B17 flew making a bombing run and dropping his bombs. Nice show. This was the first time I took my Morrisey Bravo to a meet. I must report that providence was with me. On my second flight, after checking my control surface movements, I cranked up the Zenoah G38 and I discovered that I had no control when I tried to advance the throttle! The engine went to FULL RPM by itself and ran there for a few moments; then returned to idle. While the engine was at the top end, I was frantically working the on-off switch to see if control could be obtained. No luck (yes I had turned on my radio). So I killed the engine and parked the plane for the rest of the weekend. Although temporarily depressing (thinking I was not able to fly on such a beautiful weekend) I did not consider the trip to be a wipe-out, considering the alternative. Back at my tent, I checked out the system with the engine running and it checked out just fine. This was spooky. I decided to work through the problem at home.

On safety, this speaks well for a kill-switch on big bangers. As for twostrokes, one should provide a way to kill the engine in the event of loss of control on the ground. You should be able to kill the fuel flow.

For the uneducated, my observation at these fun-flys is that there is an element of risk of higher proportion than at pattern contests. It is very difficult to control five or six pilots ON THE AIR, some in flight or all in flight, if not impossible. I have never failed to whiteness at least two close calls at these meets. Pilots need permission to take off. But dead sticks and emergency landings happen all the time. The biggest two problems are related to cross runway winds. First of all, many of these pilots do not use rudder to control their take-offs and those folks at the downwind end of the tent line must be alert not to become an inadvertent target. And this is the one that really bugs me; some the pilots fail to observe the zero line and they are not even chastised for the "violation", and continue to fly with (as the man said) with TOW-AH-TILL IMPUNITY! Nuff for now...


