I was in a quandary as to how to properly charge a 4000mAh glow plug heater that I bought at G.J.'s. After mentioning this problem to Ralph Jackson, he said "Oh, that's easy: let me show you." What Ralph showed me was a charger he had built specifically for charging this beast. The beauty of it is that you can design it to charge "any" capacity "modeling" battery. You also get a bonus in that the single-pole double-throw toggle in the circuit gives you the proper constant charge rate for those McDaniel glow plug heaters that are very popular these days. How would you like to build one? Well first you should know it is not an "el Cheapo." Simple it is, but cheap no. I say it is simple because electronics is not my strong suit; in fact, for the benefit of you bridge wizards, it is my void suit! The cost to me was about forty bucks. However, it certainly can be done for less by substituting parts you might have lying around in your personal electrical junk box or by improvisation. It can be built in about three hours, from start to finish. I say "can be" because I frogged through it in about eight hours (on and off during one day); so it is probably closer to four hours of building time. Of course, there are those of you out there that will build it in 30 minutes without the need for a schematic at all. I am not talking to you guys! This is a simple circuit almost anyone can understand. This simple circuit has the added advantage of being customized for your specific requirements. Thus, if you wish to have it service a 1200mah,

it to do it right (charge that is). So next month I promise you an article on how to build it, complete with schematic diagram, parts list and a picture or two....and suggestions on how to build to suit; how about that! 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
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From The





Wright Brothers First Flight 90th Anniversary This Month!



Greetings, fellow AGS members, from your new Vice-President. This being my second chance at this post, serving previously in 1990, maybe I can get it right this time!

My family and I have lived in Vestal for the past five years, having moved here from the Pittsburgh, PA area. My wife, Patricia, and I are both employed at Wilson Hospital as perfusionists. "What is a perfusionist?" you ask? A perfusionist is the allied health professional who operates the heart and lung machine during open-heart surgery. I am 43 years old, and was born in Gouverneur, NY, which is about a one-hour drive north of Watertown. My parents operated a dairy farm in Gouverneur which was owned by my father's parents.

During my early childhood, I have some memory of riding on my mother's lap in my father's Waco UPF-7, which he flew for the Civil Air Patrol from a pasture on the farm. Later on, as an adult, I was told by an uncle that there was usually a spot of oil on the ground beneath that Waco. This "oil on the ground" discouraged many would-be passengers! In 1956, we moved to the Cape Canaveral area of Florida where I grew up with my four younger brothers and one sister. In Florida my father worked for Convair during the early days of the Atlas ICBM program. During those early days of the space program, I saw many of the historic launches from Cape Canaveral including John Glenn's Mercury flight, the first Saturn launch and many others.

My first experience with model airplanes came during those adolescent years. My first model was a control-line stunt design whose name escapes me (*Age shows here! - Ed.*), which was powered by a McCoy .19. My skills were such that crashing was the rule, rather than the exception!

My college education was at Florida State University and later on at the University of Houston where I majored in Geology. I lived, worked and attended school in the Houston, Texas area for 11 years. My first job as a perfusionist-in-training was at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, PA, where I spent one year. In 1983 I moved from Philadelphia to Pittsburgh after

marrying Patricia. In Pittsburgh I worked for a nationwide contractor which provided perfusionists to various client hospitals around the country. Our three children were born during this six-year period in Pittsburgh. Evan, the oldest, is ten years old. Leslie is nine and Lee is five. All three attend Our Lady of Sorrows School in Vestal.

My involvement in radio-controlled model airplanes began in 1984. I became a member of the Murrysville Area RC Society near Pittsburgh where I received a lot of support and encouragement during those early days of learning to fly RC. I was a slow student, who required almost a year to become able to fly without Ed Katchmar at my side. His patience with me was far greater than I deserved. My first trainer was an Andrews Big H-Ray which, on one occasion, landed in the pit area, scattering my detractors and damaging Ed's Kaos! I tried to claim that a crosswind was the problem, but Ed astutely pointed out that with me at the controls, there was no need for explanations.

My current interests in the hobby include the shoot-out style of Competition Fun Fly. My Coal Hauler has survived an entire flying season intact (Take that Terrenoire!). I also have some casual interest in pylon racing, R/C combat and pattern flying. Also, this winter, I am planning to build my first scale model, a Nieuport 11, from a Proctor kit.



COME FLY AT MOORE PARK!

Don't forget to come on out to Moore Park, in Vestal, for our traditional New Year's Day Snow Fly in the cold! Be the first on your block to fly R/C in '94. Join the rest of the sillies in fighting the cold, wind, snow or whatever may await us on New Year's Day from 11:A.M. to 3:P.M. Moore Park is next to Take-A-Break restaurant on Old Vestal Road, and basically behind Wal-Mart. Which is a point to consider from now on in terms of our flying behavior: make sure that you don't fly off to the south very far, or your aircraft could easily be over the Towne Square Mall. Any loss of control or failure could possibly cause a crash in a very populated area. Fly safely and with care when flying at Moore Park, as well as everywhere else you fly.

Some cold-weather flying tips:

Wear lots of clothing, insulated boots, wool socks and coats with no loose strings! Wear gloves suitable for controlling the radio transmitter. A neat way to do this is to buy a pair of felt shooting gloves and cut out the thumb pad, if you're a thumb flyer. Bill Underkofler recommends latex or vinyl gloves used for house cleaning and such, because it keeps the wind off the skin. Maybe a combination of both would be the best! Bring your own thermos of hot tea, coffee or soup for that extra bit of internal warmth. Most of all, come with the attitude that no matter what, we're having fun!
