On The Net with Red Scholefield

Red Scholefield, a past AGS'er and Associate editor for RCM, reflects on his visit to our Fall Float Fly last year in his RCM column. Here are a few excerpts from Red's column:

As the days grew shorter and the sun cast longer shadows, I had the opportunity to savor the remnants of the "Northern" flying season, something I had forgotten, living in the Sunny South. My old club's (the Aeroguidance Society, Endicott, NY, one of the oldest R/C clubs in the country) 14th annual float fly coincided with our "leaf viewing" trip to New England. Having carefully planned (herself planned - I schemed) the trip for some months (and having concealed a newly finished vintage Sea-Cat into the van), I was able to participate in this wonderful "end of season" ritual.

Some interesting planes showed up to enjoy what has been claimed as the best float fly site in the Northeast, Greenwood Park. Its small lake is served by a 25 foot strip of sandy beach nearly 100 yards long and then gentle grass slope away from the water. The lake is framed in hardwoods madly competing with each other for who could display the best fall colors. For those who might think we were disturbing the balance of nature, we were treated to several flights of wild ducks that came in to see what those stiff wing purring flying things were.

There were entries of all sizes and shapes, the largest of which was a Big Nifty (96" span) on 60" Balsa USA 1/3 scale EDO floats and flown by father and son team Don and Mike Adams of Greene, NY (my hosts in the area). A contingent from Rochester, NY, that make this their annual water event, entertained all with some spectacular flying with some highly modified Northstars.

Now any float fly would not be a float fly without Cubs and this one was no exception. They showed up in droves like mosquitoes over the swamp at sundown. Cub pilot Bob Noll recorded the festivities with aerial shots taken out the side window of his Great Planes .40 Cub (OS 70 FS) using an inexpensive 35mm camera (automatic film advance). He has it programmed for flash to confirm the picture was taken.

DuBro says they should be replaced when worn but I haven't done it. As to effectiveness I can't say. I have no data to compare vibration or sound level with or without.

BANANA SPLIT PIE

1/4 c. softened oleo
3 TBS whipping cream
2 c. powdered sugar
1 tsp vanilla

Beat these ingredients until smooth.

Spread in a 9" graham cracker pie crust. Slice one banana.

Drain & chop 1 -8oz can pineapple tidbits (crushed is too moist)

Pat pineapple dry with paper towels.

Arrange bananas & pineapple on top of cream mixture.

Press in firmly.

Spread 1-1/2 c. thawed (frozen) whipped topping on top.

Sprinkle with 1/2 c. chopped pecans and 1/2 c. chopped, drained maraschino cherries.

Refrigerate 2 hours and store in refrigerator after cutting.
