The winter doldrums have definitely hit, counting the day until spring!

I've gone through all of my models and checked for any maintenance issues that need to be addressed before flying season. I highly recommend everyone do something similar with their models, I often see fliers fixing things at the field that would be much easier to address at home.

I've puttered around my workshop a bit as well, I'm good about starting model projects but get bogged down sometimes when it comes to actually finishing them. I enjoy framing with balsa, but sometimes end up shelving that model and starting something else when I hit a snag.

Such is the case with the Sporty Ace biplane, it is on the back burner while I've been framing up a Super Sportster 60. I finished a 40 size Super Sportster last fall and thought having its big brother was a good idea. I used a short kit from balsaworkbench.com to speed up my project.



I did obtain the AMA sanction for our Vintage RC Society event for Sept 2nd, the 34th Annual Spirit of Selinsgrove event. We've had consistent attendance/participation from our out-of-town friends and a core group of club members, and we've drawn a lot of casual observation from many other AGS members the past several years. Still lots of time to knock out a vintage model, anything designed before 1988 is eligible. There are literally hundreds of plans available on Outerzone, many of which are very simple and cheap to build and any are easily converted to electric power. Lots of help is available from experienced club members – one area that can be a challenge is bending wire landing gear. I can help anyone with that task, I have a wire bender and it isn't hard to bend your gear.

If you prefer building from a kit, Old School Model Works offers a number of laser cut models designed from the outset for electric or glow: <u>Old School Model Works : R/C Kits (oldschoolmodels.com)</u>

Vintage eligible kits include the Fifty-Six and Lark (replicas of the Goldberg Falcon 56 and Skylark) as well as a Kaos, Robinhood 25 and a Mambo. Their Mambo isn't a replica of the old Sterling Mambo, rather a small model that resembles a Roaring 20 – as CD I would certainly allow it in our club VRCS event.

New Year's Day Fly

The AGS has a long history of racing R/C airplanes. I remember building a Formula Falcon (Junior Falcons/.049 Cox engines) and leaving out all the formers in the fuselage to save weight. It was tough to get all the Coxes to run smoothly at the same time.

Quickie 500 was an easier class to get everyone to the starting line ready to fly. I had flown the 500s for several years, taking a break, and returning to the 500 class with my old airframe and an electric motor. It was tacked to get under14,000 RPMs which was where many of the OS motors' ran. It was a lot of fun, but a little hard on my older batteries to run 10 laps at full throttle. I only raced that one event. Last season saw no 500 races for a variety of reasons. DDW's alternative of fun flys with food was a great substitute. Thanks, Dave, for all your work to make these fun flys so much fun.

My dear friend, Lanny Noll, always spoke of the two-season world R/Cers lived in, the "Flying Season" and the "Building Season." The weather man's four season did not exist for AGSers.

So, during our "Building Season" is there any interest among us to build an EF1 racer? You can find the specifics on airframes and power equipment on line. My EF1races is easier on batteries than was my heavier Quickie 500.
