Bill Tomsa - Activities Roy Weildman - Historian Joe Felice - STRCA Rep.


Bud Grant - Field Reid Donlon - Membership T. Terrenoire - Mall show(s)

That's about it for now ..... keep the Balsa dust flying! [] Ron Gautheir






The Wright Bros. did it 81 years ago this date .... December 17.



# Action Area .... By Bob Noll

<u>HINGES</u> - They're everywhere we look,...in our home, our car, even in our bodies! Without them, our planes would be nothing more than free flight models. A short visit to G.J's Hobbies will enable you to look over hinges as made by 5 or 6 various manufacturers which are very basic in design. Some have tried to design the "better hinge" for us needy modelers.




Unfortunately, the variety that is available only seems to confuse us and appeal to our continual desire to "try the latest thing". The results are frequently less than optimum and both <u>reliability</u> and <u>performance</u> suffer!

Well then,...let me outline a few simple tips to help you do a better job of "hinging" on your next bird, and believe it or not, they are based on the simplest hinge of all.

I never use a pinned hinge and I haven't even thought about trying any of the new "Gadget" hinges because I subscribe to a very basic principal which has served me well - "KEEP IT SIMPLE, AND IF IT WORKS, STAY WITH IT". So,..... let me tell you how to install my favorite hinge,....the KRAFT POLYPROPOLYNE HINGE:


This hinge does not have a PIN for the hinge point, but rather is scored in the middle. This reduced thickness line is where the hinge actually bends. It has 8 holes, approx. 1/16" diameter which provide a place glue or adhesive to secure it to a wood surface.



If you are scratch building or are building a kit that does NOT have have the aileron, rudder, or elevator surfaces alreade shaped, then you can take advantage of a technique that guarantees the best surface alignment when you are finished. First, scribe a centerline along the rear of the stabilizer with a ball point pen. Do the same to some over-sized elevator stock. Slot the hinge


locations with a knife and then use a pointed metal nail file to file out the slot until the hinge fits snugly. Slot both the stab and elevator, and use at least 3 hinges for each seperate flying surface. (When building giant scale, DOUBLE the amount of req'd hinges).

Now insert all hinges (Do NOT glue them at this time) and tack glue the elevator to the stab. Here is a sketch to help you get the idea:



Three (3) hinges on centerline...

Now shape the elevator to the proper contour as shown and break the tack glue to seperate the elevator from the stab. Use a razor plane to put the appropriate angle on the leading edge of the elevator and remember to plane away only enough wood to allow the desired deflection. You should then be able to reassemble the elevator to the stab with all the hinges installed to check the deflection. Your stab/elevator assembly should look like this:



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#### Action Area .... continued

Now you have an assembly that has the following features:

.....ACCURATELY LOCATED HINGES. ..... NO HINGE GAPS WHICH IS CRITICAL TO PERFORMANCE. ..... EXACT ALIGNMENT OF THE ELEVATOR TO THE STAB.

I always cover my wing and tail surfaces BEFORE installing the hinges on a permanant basis. Install the hinges by squeezing some 15 min. epoxy into the hinge slots,...working the epoxy into the slots with a thin spatula. Put a light coating on the hinges before you slide them into the hinge slots. Be sure to get epoxy in the holes located on the Kraft hinge(s).

Put all the hinges into the elevator first and let them cure before gluing the hinges into the stab. When the hinges are installed, be sure to wipe away the excess epoxy that will coze out of the slots. A toothpick works well for this job.

No,...I do not stake (or pin) the hinges with toothpicks or common pins. I have not done so for over ten years and never had a hinge pull out. The holes already in the

hinge provide adequate anchorage to properly secure the hinge to the control surface of your model:

Plane TALK: by DICK ALLEN "Ski Hot Line"

If you'd like to try flying R/C with skis, here's a summary of my ski presentation at the November AGS meeting:

The NINE COMMANDMENTS OF SKI FLYING THAT HAS PROVEN SUCCESSFUL

- (1) Two skis are preferrable to three since each ski is larger and better able to bridge footprints etc.
- (2) A rigid mount is simpler, stronger, and has less drag than a flexible (spring loaded) system. Rigid\_skis must be long in front, but SHORT behind the CG to allow for take-off rotation. They should go from ahead of the prop to 80% of the wing chord.
- (3) A low wing aircraft is more stable on the snow and lends itself to a very simple mount. Use a conventional tail-dragger type mount in front and a second gear mount in the wing behind the CG.
- (4) My airplane weighs  $8\frac{1}{2}$  lbs and I use 2 skis  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " wide by 24" long. This is 0.88 in. of ski per ounce of aircraft weight.
- (5) Mount skis at O Degrees to 1 degree positive incidence.
- (6) Skis are laminated from 2 pieces of 1/16" plywood (light ply) with a 4" plywood "spine" full length.
- (7) Finish with epoxy or polyurethane.
- (8) Wax for wet snow, for ICE conditions, put a #6 wood screw in the bottom rear of each ski with the screw head projecting out a little.

- (9) Dress as if its' 20 degrees COLDER than your outdoor thermometer indicates! To keep snow off from your glasses, wear a cap with a visor and fly DOWNWIND in and during sudden snow squalls.


