SAFETY CORNER

As you read this copy of the Connector it is already September. The summer is fast waning, but there is lots of good flying whether ahead of us. Some of you may have happen upon Ed Byrnes' last column in the September issue of Model Aviation News (he is the AMA District II V. P., yours (and mine)). As it so happens we mail him copies of our Connector and he really surprised us by mentioning our Safety Motto in his column. Thank you John.

Talking about safety, I recently become aware of what I refer to as a product deficiency. The product is a power panel who's B+ and ground connections are protruding from the front of the panel and are thereby potentially able to short across a metal object (such a gas can) and cause all kinds of havoc. Please chech your power panel for exposed terminals (if you have one) and install a switch in the hot line to prevent a short from occurring in this manner.

Here are a few safety checks that can prevent the most common injuries or loss of airplane. They should be performed by even the most experienced flyers.

- 1. Always perform a radio range check in a new plane. At the field don't forget to put your card in the flying position on the frequency board. Engine should be running at all speeds during range check.
- 2. Take the time to paint your prop tips for better visibility.
- 3. Check your antenna for good connection, look for signs of corrosion at the base connection; disconnect and inspect the contact if it's secured by a cap screw. If you find a kink in any section, replace the antenna as soon as possible.
- 4. Does the plane balance correctly according to plans?
- 5. Do control surfaces operate in the conventional manner. For example: down throttle movement on the transmitter should result in low engine speed and visa versa.
- 6. Does the aircraft have proper identification on it? This is AMA general rule #6 (remember)?

That's it for this month. Oh yes, remember ...don't fly with thunder and or lighting in the area. Have a safe month.

Safety is No Accident, Make it Not Happen!

THE ACTION AREA - by BOB NOLL

<u>HELPFUL HINTS</u> - If you use rubber bands to attach the wing be sure to follow a few simple but important rules for better performance and higher reliability.

- Use at least 8 rubber bands, four on each side.
- Place the first 3 or 4 bands front to back, DO NOT CRIS-CROSS. Cris-crossing all of the bands will not hold the wing firmly and allow the wing to rock from left to right.
- Cris-cross only the last 2 bands, cris-crossing is for reliability as it insures that the main bands do not slip off of the dowls.
- When putting on the bands, attach the band to the forward or leading edge dowl first and stretch it over the wing and then attach it to the trailing edge dowl. This will insure that the leading edge of the wing will not life up from the fuselage during high G maneuvers.
- When installing the leading edge dowl, be sure to position it as high as possible in order that there will not be very much rubber band between the dowl and the leading edge of the wing. Too much band here will contribute to the wing lifting from the fuselage during high G maneuvers.
- Keep the bands clean and fresh. Putting them in a container with talcum powder will dry them out when not in use. Better yet, by an extra box and use fresh bands at each flying session.

Connector Sept 87 float fly:




