Don't Get Ticked...!!!

Last week Brent Bryson sent out a note stating how he had picked up a deer tick while working at the field cleanup on Saturday. He sent out a note telling everyone who was at the event to check themselves for deer ticks. He stated that deer ticks were out in force this year.

I did a little research on the subject and came up with the following information. Without going into an explanation of the life cycle of the tick, it is sufficient to say that at each stage of their growth, ticks look for a host to suck blood from so that they can continue to develop and morph into their next stage of existence. That could be an animal like a deer or mouse, or it could be one of us. The key is to keep the little critters off of your body to thwart their plans.

There are two ways that the ticks can hitch a ride on you. Larvae can climb up onto your shoes from ground level. Adult ticks can climb up onto tall grass and move directly onto your legs. The trick is to keep them off, or kill them if they succeed in reaching you. One method is to wear clothing with a tight weave. This will make it more difficult for the adult ticks to grab your clothing. A second method is to gather your pants together at the ankle, and then roll your socks up over them. This looks kind of strange but helps to minimize exposed skin area. Also, wearing light-colored clothing makes them easier to see if they do climb onto you.

To repel or kill the ticks, there are a couple of chemical alternatives. First is DEET which will help to make you unpalatable. Spraying this onto your shoes and clothing will help to keep them off of you. The second is Permethrin. This chemical may be sprayed directly onto your clothing and then allowed to dry. Ticks that crawl onto Permethrin-treated clothing will die within 5 – 30 seconds. You can treat your own clothes with this chemical, or you can buy clothing that has been pre-treated by the manufacturer. Self-treated clothing will remain effective for five washings or so. Commercially-treated clothing will remain effective for up to 70 washings. A company called Insect Shield sells treated clothing and there are probably more companies, besides.

If a tick does manage to latch onto you, it cannot transmit illnesses like Lyme disease until it has been attached for at least 24 hours. If the tick is removed before that time has elapsed, you should be okay. After you've been at the field, check yourself over when you get home, especially if you've had to go out into the tall grass or woods to retrieve a model. Don't forget the "private parts", since they're great places for ticks to hide while they chow down. If you do find a tick, have it removed by your doctor, or at a walk-in clinic. They should be able to do this in a way that will prevent infection.

A little extra diligence will help all of us to insure that we have a safe summer without anyone getting "ticked" unnecessarily.

AGS General Meeting Minutes

Aero Guidance Society Meeting #798

Date: April 7, 2014

Place: Endicott Public Library

President Allabaugh called the meeting to order at 6:45 PM.

Neil Hunt and Luke Brookhart were introduced as guests.

The minutes of the last meeting were accepted as published in The Connector.

Bob Noll read a summary of the last BOD meeting held on March 17, 2014.

The Treasurer's Report was given by Todd Kopl. The report is available from Todd.

Rick reported that Mike Harris, Todd Kopl and he have not been able to schedule a meeting to implement the new financial system.

Activities Reports:

Field Cleanup – Field Chairman, Jim Quinn, reported that the field seems OK but the parking area is very wet. Due to this and the weather forecast for the next several days the work party scheduled for Saturday April 12 will be postponed until April 26.

Bob Jennings asked all members to drive "on the high spots" of the road which helps level the road.

Jim Quinn will place a barrier across the access road at the last turn to prevent vehicles from getting stuck in the parking area.

Historian Don Green mentioned that new photos are on Facebook.

Float Fly – Bob Balsie said that the sanction and insurance is in process.

Pattern Primer – Jeff Hatton was asked to contact Don Shugard, Activities Chairman, about making the Primer a non-sanctioned event for club members.

Model Aviation Day – the BOD has suggested this event as it is part of our Gold Club Leader requirements. Don Shugard is requested to put it on his Activities Calendar. Jeff Hatton mentioned that the club is eligible for an AMA grant for this event. Bob Balsie said we need better publicity for the 2014 event.

Indoor Flying – Mike Harris reported that the first session was held on April 3 and was very successful. The indoor sessions are held Thursdays from 7 to 9 PM at West Middle School in Binghamton.

Spring Fling – Jim Quinn reported that there was a large attendance at the event but low temperatures and high winds minimized the flying. Jim reported a profit of \$15.19. Jim also described how his small LiPo battery with a mini-deans connector started to burn in his pocket.

Holiday Party – Rick said that he mentioned to Don Shugard, Activities Chairman, that he could replace the Holiday Party with a family day at the flying field or another social event.

Old Business:

Bob Jennings reported that the frequency sharing agreement with the "Faber Group" has been discontinued since the only remaining member is now flying on 2.4 GHz. Bob Noll reported that the AMA District II VP has been notified and accepted our action. Bob Noll has the unused frequency pins and will return them to the Flight Control Center.

It was noted that Channel 42 is still unusable at the field because of past problems unassociated with the frequency sharing agreement.

Property sale - Rick mentioned that our neighbor Dan still wants to purchase a parcel of our property. Frank Gioffredo volunteered to head up a committee to pursue the sale.

Bob Noll reported that the club is AMA Chartered for 2014.

New Business:

It was suggested that the club membership brochure be put on Facebook and the club web site. A motion was made by Rick Allabaugh and seconded by Jim Quinn to put the membership brochure on Facebook.

A motion to amend the above motion was made by Rick Allabaugh and seconded by Jim Quinn. This was to put <u>both</u> the membership brochure and The Connector on both Facebook and the club website. The amended motion carried. Mike Harris will contact John Carril, Membership Chairman, regarding the brochure on Facebook and Bob Balsie, newsletter editor, regarding The Connector.

Jeff Hatton said there is interest at Vestal Middle School for an after-school program on indoor model aircraft. Rick asked Jeff to express support from the club and follow-up with the school.

Frank Gioffredo said that his son Derek put a proposal together for a BOCES program for ready to fly indoor foam planes. This would be funded by BOCES.

Neil Hunt was introduced as a new member.

Field Rules – Frank Gioffredo, Safety Chairman, presented the current Field Rules. This is a Gold Leader Club requirement.

Show & Tell:

Frank Gioffredo showed a LiPo battery for motorcycles. It is very light but costs \$175.

Mike Harris explained his "RCCALLER" that uses a cell phone to speak the maneuvers for various sequences. It is available from Mike at myrccaller.com and Mike will give any AGS member unlimited minutes.

Rick Allabaugh displayed some old "AGS stuff" such as home made patches, the original sketch for the club patch, a club decal glass photo plate, contest photos and an old pattern contest program with advertising.

Program:

Bob Noll circulated copies and presented his "Pattern Flyer's Check List". Ray Phillips questioned Bob's statement that a forward CG is better when starting to fly a new plane. This is correct since this means the plane is slightly nose heavy which is preferable.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 PM
