Not much more for me to say regarding the ongoing AMA vs. FAA debate. I firmly believe the AMA has very limited ability to affect any policy coming from the government regarding any regulations regarding "drones" or more correctly Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems (SUAS). I also feel the AMA totally misplayed their hand when it comes to SUAS's and were initially smitten thinking the exponential growing interest and sales of drones/quads would lead to droves of "new blood" joining the AMA and swelling their ranks, and greatly increasing AMA's coffers. In reality, that hasn't and won't happen.

Unfortunately I did not find much at the WRAMs show by the way of new and exciting things for the kit builder. My favorite models are the in the 40-90 sized glow engine area and here in particular new offerings are few and far between. Electric aircraft from micro sized to about 60" wingspan and then much, much larger gasoline engine powered aircraft are where the fixed wing portion of the hobby is in 2016.

My "drive for five" effort to build five models this winter season is therefore somewhat setback as I hoped to pick up a new kit at the WRAMs show. I already assembled a 40 size Aeroworks Pro-X 260 profile (and have flown it), finished a deBolt Champ for VRCS, and framed up an Ace RC Bingo for Frank.

Model #4 is a Sig Hog biplane that is now ready for paint. The Hog Bipe is a great flying plane and also gives me a model for the Biplanes over Ithaca event.

For model #5 I had planned on a 90 4 cycle size warbird, but I've honestly not found any new releases worth tackling. I don't want the usual P-51, P-47, Zero, Spitfire, etc.

I've often thought about building something 'giant scale' but I always some back to the fact that for me storage and transportation of giant scale models is a problem. I for one will never own an enclosed trailer for transporting models! Besides I can build 2 or 3 "normal" sized models for the cost of one big model.

So, I reached into my stash of kits a chose a subject – more to follow in coming months.

Bob Noll brought some pictures from AGS's past. These featured Ralph Jackson's B-24 Liberator with 4 Fox 15

engines and flown with an early proportional radio system. This airplane is believed to be the first 4 engine RC aircraft flown in competition. I remember seeing this airplane fly at a contest in Milton, Pa.

Scott Wallace showed an ACE Bingo 40 that he framed up for Frank. It is always inspiring to see Scott's craftsmanship.

Charlie Brown presented a program on the fundamentals of electric propulsion. The program covered motor selection for performance, batteries and power calculations. Charlie recommends a free internet site that will work through the calculations and allows you to vary parameters to see the results.

The first thing I have to say is even though it is a 6 hour drive down and back it really didn't matter because it was just great to get away and break up the cabin fever that had been building up. It was also nice to do something with other club members by carpooling down together. You not only can save some on traveling expenses but you also get to know a little more about each other when you are a captive audience in a rolling cage.

This was my first time at a large hobby convention like the WRAM but not my first "trade" show so I was somewhat surprised by the entrance fee especially being that the majority of folks that are in this hobby are getting on with the time clock of life and the management of expendable finance. I just made sure that I walked out of there with more goodies than what I paid to get in..... Haaa.

So here we are on the first day of the 3 day show, when I first walked thru the doors (after hitting the men' room because of a 3 hr drive) my first impression was this is going to be fun because with in about 20 steps I could see the 30 yard long length of tables in the center of the building with the static display of scale models for competition judging on Sunday. The cable rigging and engine detail was phenomenal and the size of this model was spectacular, I swear it had at least a 15 foot span.

There was according to the show directory that they hand you when first enter approximately 140 vendors. They covered the gamut from bits-n-pieces guys selling stuff that you could get at local hobby store(that is as if WE had one in the triple cities) to major OEM's like Beacon, Castle, Horizon, Robart, and Sullivan to name a few. There were also the various organizations like the AMA, FAA, Rhinebeck and Vintage R/C Society to high lite a few. Our own Bob Noll was manning the Vintage R/C booth for the 3 day event.

In light of the recent issues going on between the FAA and the AMA, the various representatives were kept quite busy answering questions throughout the day. Changes in the Saito engine line – submitted by Scott Wallace

For those that still enjoy operating model engines as opposed to electric motors, some news from Japan regarding the excellent Saito 4 stroke engines.

Saito will be pruning quite a few glow engines from their lineup effective immediately. Saito will stop production on their single cylinder 56, 72, 91, 115 and 220 sized four strokes as well as their 90 and 100 twin cylinder models. They will still offer the 40, 62, 82, 100 and 125 engines so there's still ample choice in the popular sizes. It isn't clear what the status is of the big1.50 and 1.80 singles are as they were not mentioned as being dropped or not. There was also no mention of impact to their line of gasoline 4 stroke engines but these engines are very expensive compared to their glow equivalent so I cannot imagine there's much of a market for them.

With electric power taking over in general and especially for everything that was traditionally "40 size" and under plus modelers preferring far cheaper gas 2 cycle engines such as DLE for larger models it's just a sign of the times that Saito is cutting back its lineup. On the other hand, with so many folks going strictly electric to power their models I'm finding that NIB or almost brand new glow engines are cheap and plentiful in the classified ads on RC Groups and RC Universe ©

Spent a very enjoyable day at the recent WRAMs RC trade show with Ray Phillips and Charlie Brown, the show is held at the Meadowlands Convention Center in Secaucus, N.J. In the past I've always gone on a Saturday or Sunday, this time going on the opening Friday gave a more relaxed time with less crowding at the popular booths. Though certainly available if you wanted them drones have not "taken over" the show as had been speculated by many.

Still a lot of vendors aimed at the giant scale market but plenty of stuff to checkout for the average modeler. Extreme Flight was there promoting its new line general aviation electric models, several neat offerings and just maybe we'll see one example flying soon at the AGS field. Their line of electric aerobatic models is quite impressive as well, from 48" span aimed for 3S packs up to very large scale stuff, I must say I'm very tempted to get one of their 60" span Yaks. Extreme Flight will also be releasing a line of warbirds for 6S packs – first out will be a beautiful FW-190.

We all occasionally have those bad days at the field where we crash a model, although these 'bad' days are much fewer than they were just 20 years ago as our equipment is much more reliable. For those kind of days, Sullivan products had a neat product at the WRAMs show they called an "RC model recovery system" and even better is the price was only one dollar. For your hard earned dollar you got a black 30 gallon trash bag, ready to use for collecting the bits and pieces of your crashed model!

As always, lots of interesting models in static display, this Gee Bee Z and WW1 German Siemens-Schuckert biplane were two of my favorites.
